Standing Resolutions

- 1. The club shall be managed by a set of Standing Resolutions approved by the members.
- 2. Club is managed by elected office bearers at an Annual General Meeting held and two committee members in accordance with the clubs Constitution.
- 3. The Club shall meet monthly on the 1st Wednesday of each month at 8-00pm in the general assembly hall of the North Katoomba Public School.
- 4. The Club may meet at another location and time and venue if decided by members in an open meeting.
- 5. Club's AGM shall be held each December at the conclusion of the General Meeting. The President shall declare all Committee positions vacant and appoint a returning office. After all officer bearers have been elected the new bearers shall take their elected position. If a ballot is required a past President or Committee member present shall be a scrutineer and distribute and collect ballot papers. Only financial members are eligible to vote.
- 6. Club's Public Officer shall be appointed at each Annual General Meeting.
- 7. The Club must keep a record copy of all vehicles participating in the Historic Vehicle Scheme and these records are for Club Official use only.
- 8. Annual member subscription is payable by each member at the current annual fee. This fee must be paid no later than 31st December each year.
- 9. Each member attending a General Meeting must sign the Attendance Book to be covered by Club's insurance.
- 10. The Club is a member of the Council of Motor Cars.
- 11. Club has a web site that displays the Constitution.
- 12. Club web site shall display the Monthly Club runs.

- 13. For a member to participate in the 60-day Registration Historic Vehicle Scheme, (HVS) shall abide by the NSW Government RMS Rules and Regulations. These Rules are available on:

 http://www.rms.nsw.gov.au/roads/registration/get-nsw-registration/vehicle-
- **14.** A member must be financial with A.H.M.C. Blue Mountains to be eligible for the benefits of the Historic Vehicle Scheme and provide the Club Registrar photographs of that vehicle or Motorcycle.
- 15. A member wishing to participate in the Concessional Vehicle Scheme must forward the necessary documentation to the Council of Motor Cars after receiving primary club approval.
- 16. If the member is not participating in the HSV (60-day) they must only use such vehicle in Club organised events. If the vehicle is to be used outside a Club event, then an approved Travel Permit must be obtained from the Secretary.
- 17. Members are expected to attend monthly general club meeting and club runs as advertised on the web site.
- 18. These Standing Resolutions may be amended at a general meeting so long as a quorum is present consisting of a minimum of 25% of financial members are present.



President Andrew Moyle welcome 33 members and 3 visitors.



Datsun 240z/Fairlady- Some Facts and History

Origins

Hashimoto founded the Kaishinsha Motor Car Works in 1911. The first prototype of 1912 was completely unsuccessful, but the second chassis built the following year was much better and received first prize at Tokyo Expo in 1914. In recognition of the help Hashimoto received, he called his cars Dat. In 1925 Kaishinsha changed its name to DAT Motor Car Manufacturing Co Ltd. Around this time and up to 1923 there were only fewer than 15000 in the country. However, a devastating Kanto earthquake of that year brought a flurry of import trucks and buses from the USA.

Demand for American vehicles was great for Ford and General Motors. Dat managed to remain in business, but in 1931 Dat was taken over by Tobata Imono who made its fortune as a foundry manufacturing component for the motor industry. DAT was reorganised in Osaka with its products renamed Datson. The Datson 91 was the first car to appear after the takeover in 1932. It was pointed out to Imono Son can be taken to mean a loss or disadvantage. After a typhoon flooded the DAT works management took this as an omen and changed the name to Datsun in 1932

In December 1933 in Yokohama a new company was formed by Tobata Imono and Nihon Sanyo. In 1934 Nihon Sanyo became the sole owner (Nissan) and formed Nissan Motor Co Ltd. Nissan kept making light cars under the Datsun name so if it failed it was not related to Nissan. Some even made their way to Australia.

In 1936 Japan changed the Law leaning towards Military manufacturing. This influenced Ford and GM closing completely in 1937, and Japanese vehicle production reached its peak in 1941. The major produces were towards military use.

In 1945 General MacArthur granted permission for Nissan to produce a Nissan 180 truck.

The rest is history.

Fairlady 1500 & 1600


The first Datsun Sport Car of the modern time recognised in Australia is the Datsun Fairlady 1500 (1488cc) Code No SP310 producing 80bhp. This was superseded by Datsun Fairlady 1600 (1595cc) Code No SP311 producing 90bhp.

The Fairlady 1500 and 1600 were available for home and export in left and right hand drive. They were powered by a four (4) cylinder engine fitted with two Hitachi HJB38W-1 carburettors on the

1500, while the 1600 was fitted with HJB38w-3 carburettors. Each were fitted with wind up side windows, seat belts, clock, radio, cigarette lighter, alternator, heating and windscreen washers.

The 1600 was the first to be fitted with synchromesh gearbox on all four gears.

While no figures are available of sales in Australia, in America between 1962-70, 38577 in total were sold.



Datsun 240Z


Datsun 240Z or as the Americans call them ZEE was launched on 24th October 1969 at the Tokyo Motor Show. In Japan they are known as Fairlady and were fitted with an L20 or S20 six-cylinder 2 litre engines to meet Tax Laws.

Exported 240Zs were fitted with an L24 SOHC (2393cc) cast iron block, this gave 151bhp at 5600rpm and 146lbft torque at 4400 rpm. The cylinder head is aluminium with twin HJG46W-8 Hitachi carburettors. The engine is almost an exact copy of the Mercedes Benz block fitted into the Datsun P510 with two extra cylinders added.

The 240Z was wind tunnel tested to reduce wind drag. It had full independent suspension and rack and pinion steering, which was rare for Japanese cars of the time. Brakes were dual circuit split front to rear, 10.7 in disc on the front and alloy drums rear complete with limiting valve and booster by Bendix Servo.

A full set of gauges were fitted with adjustable light, clock, radio, lockable glove box, heater, and ventilation system. Other features included clutch footrest, map lamp, under bonnet trouble lamp with extending power cord, dipping rear view mirror, bootstraps to secure luggage, twin storage in boot for jack and tools and spare wheel placed under boot floor. Outside of Japan America was the largest importer of 240Z, also known as "240 oz".





In Japan, Fairladys (240Z) were available with various models such as Z, ZL, Z432R. The Z was standard, ZL luxury and Z432R high performance. Z432R only available to a small number of dealers and are much sought after. All were fitted with L20 or S20 (1998cc) six cylinders.

The 240Z came with a standard body and fittings while the ZL was fitted with the G nose and luxury fittings. The G nose made the Z look similar to a Ferrari of that time.

The 240Z in Australia came with a 5-speed manual or 3 speed automatic and was fitted with a L24 SOHC (2393cc) six cylinder engine rated at 150bhp. They were available in 6 colours and fitted with a 6mm safety glass windscreen. The Interiors were almost exclusively black.

The G nose added an extra 190mm in length and were homologated for Race and Rally.

The 240Z competed in International Rally and Racing in production class in SCCA (America) and were successful as well as in Japan. The 240Zs are also appearing in numbers in Historic racing in Australia. The best known racing Z was BIG SAM raced very successful by Win Percy in Britain.

If you are interested a firm in America are restoring Zs to as new condition for purchase.
